A BILL

To abolish the Department of Health and Human Services and its sub-agencies.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the "Department of Health and Human Services Abolishment Act". SECTION 2. ABOLISHMENT.

(a) In General.—Effective 180 days after enactment, the Department of Health and Human Services (established under Reorganization Plan No. 1 of 1953 (67 Stat. 631)) and all its sub-agencies, including the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, National Institutes of Health, Food and Drug Administration, Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, Health Resources and Services Administration, Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, Administration for Children and Families, Administration for Community Living, Indian Health Service, and Office of the Surgeon General, are abolished.

SECTION 3. TRANSFER OF FUNCTIONS AND ASSETS.

- (a) Plan.—Within 90 days of enactment, the President shall submit to Congress a plan to transfer essential functions to other Federal agencies (e.g., Interior, Treasury, State) or terminate them.
- (b) Assets and Liabilities.—Assets shall transfer per the plan or revert to the Treasury; liabilities shall be assumed by the United States.

SECTION 4. PERSONNEL.

Employment terminates on the effective date, except for personnel transferred under the plan, subject to civil service laws.

SECTION 5. REPEALS AND AMENDMENTS.

- (a) Repeals.—Reorganization Plan No. 1 of 1953 (67 Stat. 631), and inconsistent laws are repealed.
- (b) Amendments.—Within 90 days, the Office of Management and Budget shall propose conforming amendments to Congress.

SECTION 6. SAVINGS PROVISIONS.

Pending proceedings, contracts, and obligations continue under successor entities.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Act takes effect on enactment, except as provided.
